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Welcome from the Local Organizing Committee

Welcome to Chicago! The MSA conference on Migration has finally arrived! Building on the initial planning for the 2021 conference that did not take place, we are enormously pleased to share a schedule of events that will emphasize the rich and complex history of Chicago and its relationship to modernist culture.

The layered history of Chicago tells a series of stories of forced removals, relocations, and displacements. The city is situated within the original homelands of the Council of the Three Fires, the Ojibwe, Potawatomi, and Odawa, who were forced to relocate west of the Mississippi after the 1833 Treaty of Chicago. Under the 1956 Indian Relocation Act, Chicago became a central destination for relocated Indigenous people and communities. It was also a major destination during the Great Migration, the mass exodus of African Americans from the Jim Crow South to the industrial centers of the North from 1916-1970. Alongside such histories, the conference theme asks us to consider more broadly the roles and relations of deterritorialization, exile, and diaspora in literary and artistic production.

The conference setting, the historic Drake Hotel, inspired an early scene in Nella Larsen's 1929 novel *Passing* in which two mixed race women, both passing as white, have tea in the whites-only restaurant at the Drake, renamed the "Drayton" in the novel. The extreme risk that the women faced in that scene may be considered historical, but we know that discrimination and segregation in Chicago are still relevant, profound problems. Rebecca Hall's 2021 film adaptation, which we will show on Saturday as part of our plenary event, moves the location of the scene to New York, but the project reminds us of the ways the issues presented in the book and the film are contemporary and unresolved.

As part of our extended conversation about migration, relocation, and modernist innovation, we invite participants to attend a special exhibit at the Jane Addams Hull House museum, "Radical Craft: Arts Education at Hull-House, 1889-1935" on Friday (followed by a plenary roundtable at the Drake). The exhibition celebrates the work of immigrant artists and reformers at the country's most important social settlement. Other events, such as a tour of Bronzeville on Thursday, a tour of the Arts Club of Chicago on Friday, and a walking tour of the Streeterville neighborhood on Saturday, will give conference goers an intimate opportunity to experience some of Chicago's culturally significant locations.

We hope that the range of events, panels, seminars, and workshops at the conference will enable new conversations about the impact of complex demographic movements on modernist innovation in literature, drama, music, art, architecture, and design in the twentieth- and twenty-first centuries. Beyond these planned events, please take advantage of the many other cultural institutions at our doorstep!

This year's annual conference of the Modernist Studies Association, postponed from 2021 and twiceplanned because of COVID, feels a bit like a double exposure, overlaying two moments in time so that the one becomes a container for the other. Thanks to the 2021 organizing committee, whose foundational efforts are now coming to fruition. The members of this year's organizing committee—Karen Leick, Cyraina Johnson-Roullier, Christine Fouirnaies, Bridget English, and Melissa Bradshaw—have made the conference their own and put together a fantastic array of events, excursions, walks, and talks to accompany the many workshops, seminars, roundtables, and panels. Karen, especially, took care of all aspects of the conference, from the mundane to the monumental. Without her unflagging efforts, the conference could not have taken place. Enormous thanks, too, to MSA board members Pardis Dabashi (Program Chair), Matthew Levay (Program Vice-Chair), Steven Nathaniel (Tech Chair), and Matthew Eatough (Treasurer), who have shouldered much of the unglamorous, behind-the-scenes labor of building the conference structure, budgets, and the program you have before you.

The Local Organizing Committee and the MSA's new Special Interest Groups (SIGs) composed five thematic conference streams that run across the three days of programming, tying modernism and the conference theme more broadly to film, feminism, race, the environment, Chicago, praxis and pedagogy. Thanks to all the SIG leaders for their assistance with the conference and for helping develop these groups. A call for proposals for new SIGs will go out later this fall, and all members are welcome and encouraged to apply.

Looking ahead, plans are well underway for MSA 2025 in Boston. I am thrilled to announce that MSA 2026 will be held at Loughborough University, UK, co-hosted by the British Association for Modernist Studies. In the meantime, enjoy Chicago!

Code of Conduct & Anti-Harassment Policy

The MSA calls upon its members to support these values of ethical conduct, mutual respect, inclusion, and nondiscrimination in judgment and in action, in order for the MSA to fulfill its mission and promote our values of free inquiry, collaboration, openness, access, and equity. We expect that all of our members have the same opportunity to reap the full benefits of belonging, and MSA members are expected to participate in the work of the organization with integrity and the highest standards of professionalism. The MSA Executive Committee expects all MSA members to abide by this Code of Conduct at any events, even those not sponsored by the organization. The Anti-Harassment Policy applies to formal participation in the MSA community, including, but not limited to:

- Attendees of MSA-sponsored events, including attendees to the Conference and other formal MSA bodies: Any event sponsored by the Modernist Studies Association, and any communications or behavior occurring at said sponsored event.
- Examples include attendees at the Conference (a panel, a seminar, a roundtable); also, any other proceeding, event, or program directly sponsored by the MSA, such as a formal mentoring workshop, Book Prize committee, and digital MSA programming; note that this list is illustrative, not exhaustive.
- In terms of the scope of the MSA Anti-Harassment Policy, we refrain the right to exclude behavior at other conferences or colloquia sponsored by other institutions, such as at a college or university; events sponsored by another professional organization; etc.
- However, note that these non-MSA-based infractions can still be reported to the MSA.

The MSA Code of Conduct applies to all professional behaviors conducted by its members, whether at MSA-sponsored events or elsewhere; whereas the Anti-Harassment Policy is more restricted in scope. However, this restricted scope ensures the MSA has jurisdiction for formally investigating reported complaints about violating the Policy, and legitimately enforcing documented violations of said policy. In particular, faithfully abiding by the Code of Conduct means that MSA members attending the Annual Conference or any other MSA event or proceeding, as well as MSA members who attend events or functions at other institutions, should not:

- Exploit or discriminate against others on grounds such as race, ethnicity, gender, gender identity or expression, sexual orientation, disability, physical appearance, religion, or other group identity.
- Be sexually inappropriate in language or gestures of unwarranted intimacy or unwelcome advances, nor harass anyone they come into professional contact with, including students, colleagues, exhibitors, and staff members
- Use language that is prejudicial or gratuitously derogatory with regard to citation, analysis, commentary, discussion, or visual communication (such as screenshots or other projections), including racist, transphobic, homophobic, ableist, sexist, and other slurs. It is the responsibility of each member to abide by best practices in adopting inclusive language, such as "Writing About Slavery/Teaching About Slavery: This Might Help" and the Modern Language Association's "Principles of Inclusive Language."
- Make prejudicial or arbitrary judgments (e.g., in evaluating MSA conference proposals or research/ travel grant applications) that might unfairly affect the academic freedom or professional development of anyone with whom they work.
- Fail to disclose conflicts of interest (personal, professional, and commercial) as they relate to MSA programs and competitions.
- Practice deceit or fraud on the academic community or the public, including plagiarizing the work of others in written or spoken discourse.

This reporting process will remain confidential.

Types of Sessions

The MSA 2024 Conference will feature four types of sessions:

Panels, of three or four short papers (15-20 minutes, depending on number of presentations) on related topics, followed by Q&A. 90 minutes. Attendance open.

Roundtables, generally featuring four or more speakers making remarks of 5-10 minutes each on a specific topic or set of topics. Audience discussion encouraged. 90 minutes. Attendance open. **Seminars**, featuring guided discussion of precirculated short papers by registered attendees, sometimes with the involvement of an invited participant. Sign-up at registration required. Generally capped at 15 participants per seminar, including leader(s) and invited participant(s). Two hours. Attendance is generally restricted to leaders, invited participants, and registered attendees.

Workshops, featuring presentations, discussions, demonstrations, and more, on topics of interest to researchers in modernist studies. Two hours. Pre-registration required.

Conference Streams

Our program incorporates five "Streams" of interconnected seminars, roundtables, and panels that are composed from individual paper proposals. Each stream has been organized by members of the MSA's Special Interest Groups (SIGs), the Local Organizing Committee, and the Program Committee.

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MODERNISM/MODERNITY'S CHICAGO Chicago LOC Stream

This stream invites papers that deal with any aspect of modernism or modernity as it relates to the midwestern metropolis. Home to continually new waves of migrants, Chicago was (and is) a place marked by constant change and multitudinous movements. As the birthplace of important modernist magazines like *Poetry* and *The Little Review*, early 20th-century Chicago was at the center of literary and artistic innovations in music, art, theatre, film, activism, and architecture. Papers for this stream may consider the importance of Chicago as a site of modernist transformation and exchange, but also as a locus of modernity. From skyscrapers to settlement houses, from railroads to community organizations, the city of Chicago has been shaped by infrastructures of modernity, which have in turn exerted an influence on city inhabitants, writers, and artists alike.

MODERNIST PEDAGOGIES Modernism and Pedagogy SIG

We invite papers that address pedagogical concerns: approaches to teaching modernist texts in all types of courses (literature surveys; first-year writing; basic writing; modernist novel, etc.); how modernist studies connects to other disciplines in the classroom, such as creative writing, composition studies, or women's & gender studies, to name a few; the pedagogies in and of modernist texts/artists; as well as modernism's place(s) in the history of pedagogy/education. We are also very interested in revealing the connection between pedagogy and scholarship -- how do we articulate this relationship? Lastly, we hope papers will address the lived conditions of our teaching labor, with institutional pressures and constraints both demanding creativity in our pedagogy as it potentially creates limits.

Chicago Encounters Plenary 5:00 p.m. – 6:30 p.m. Gold Coast Room

Inspired by the New York Review Classic reissue of Rachel's Cohen's book, *A Chance Meeting* (2004), this conversation will explore moments of meeting, brief or sustained, which have palpably shaped the nature of artistic expression in Chicago and beyond.

Discussants:

Adrienne Brown is Associate Professor in the Departments of English and Race, Diaspora, and Indigeneity at the University of Chicago. She is also the Director of Arts + Public Life, a hub for artistic exploration, expression, and exchange that centers people of color and fosters neighborhood vibrancy on Chicago's South Side. She is co-editor with Valerie Smith of the volume *Race and Real Estate* (2015) and the author of *The Black Skyscraper: Architecture and the Perception of Race*, winner of the 2018 First Book Prize from the Modernist Studies Association, and *The Residential is Racial: A Perceptual History of Mass Homeownership*, published by Stanford University Press in 2024.

Rachel Cohen is Professor of Practice in the Arts at the University of Chicago. Her first book, *A Chance Meeting: Intertwined Lives of American Writers* and Artists, (Random House, 2004) is a series of thirty-six linked essays about the encounters among thirty figures in American history during the long century from the civil war through the civil rights movement. She is also the author of Bernard Berenson: A Life in the Picture Trade, (Yale University Press, 2013) and Austen Years: A Memoir in Five Novels (FSG, 2020) Her essays have appeared in The New Yorker, The Guardian, The London Review of Books, Apollo, The New York Times, The Nation, The Threepenny Review, The Believer, McSweeney's and other publications.

Jacqueline Goldsby is Thomas E. Donnelly Professor of African American Studies and English, and Professor of American Studies at Yale University. She specializes in African American literary criticism and book history during the long century of Jim Crow segregation, from 1865 to 1965. She is the author of the prizewinning A Spectacular Secret: Lynching in American Life and Literature (University of Chicago Press, 2006) and edited the Norton Critical Edition of James Weldon Johnson's The Autobiography of an Ex-Colored Man. Long active in Black Digital Humanities and Archival Studies, Goldsby designed and directed "Mapping the Stacks: A Guide to Black Chicago's Hidden Archives." Together with Mcredith McGill (Rutgers University), she now co-directs The Black Bibliography Project. Goldsby's currently at work on two book projects: Writing from the Lower Frequencies: African American Literature and Its Mid-Century Moment and Doing a New Thing: The Art and Life of James Baldwin.

Liesl Olson is the Director of Jane Addams Hull-House Museum and Professor in the College of Architecture, Design, and the Arts, at the University of Illinois at Chicago. She is the author of <u>Modernism and the Ordinary</u> (Oxford, 2009), and <u>Chicago Renaissance: Literature and Art in</u> <u>the Midwest Metropolis</u> (Yale, 2017). Her next book is called "Now We See the World Together: Five Midwesterners and the Revolution of Modern Art," and is forthcoming from Norton. At Hull-House Olson just opened a new exhibition with a catalog called <u>Radical Craft: Arts Education at Hull-</u> <u>House</u>, which celebrates the work of immigrant artists and reformers at the country's most important social settlement.

Screening of the film Passing (2021) and Plenary Roundtable 4:00 p.m. – 7:00 p.m. Grand Ballroom

British actress Rebecca Hall's directorial debut film, *Passing*, adapts the Harlem Renaissance author Nella Larsen's 1929 novel of the same name. Both film and novel depict the tense relationship between two biracial women, resulting from the decision of one to deny her black heritage by choosing to live as a white person.

The film will be introduced by **Chaz Ebert**, CEO of Ebert Digital LLC, publisher of the preeminent movie review site RogerEbert.com, TV/movie producer at Ebert Productions, and executive producer of the film *Passing*. For twenty-four years, she shared a life with Pulitzer Prize-winner Roger Ebert. In their work to foster empathy through cinema, they established the Ebertfest Film Festival and the Roger Ebert Center for Film Studies at the University of Illinois. She continues to nurture film critics and filmmakers through the Roger Ebert Fellowship, and awards the Golden Thumb and Ebert Humanitarian Awards to filmmakers who exhibit an unusually compassionate view of the world.

Screening of the film will be followed by a roundtable offering insights into the meaning, history and cultural significance of the film, and opening up possibilities for further discussion.

Discussants:

Pardis Dabashi is Assistant Professor of English and Film Studies at Bryn Mawr College, where she is also affiliated faculty in the Middle Eastern studies program and the Comparative Literature program. She is author of *Losing the Plot: Film and Feeling in the Modern Novel* (University of Chicago Press, 2023), and co-editor of the Visualities forum on *Modernism/modernity Print+*. **Rafael Walker** is assistant professor of English at Baruch College, City University of New York. He has published widely in the field of American literature, including his essay "Nella Larsen Reconsidered: The Trouble with Desire in *Quicksand* and *Passing*," which won the Crompton Noll Award (2017) for Best Essay in LGBTQ studies, and editions of *Nella Larsen's Passing* (Broadview Press, 2023) and Kate Chopin's *The Awakening and Selected Stories* (Warbler Classics Edition, 2021). His book, *Realism after the Individual: Women, Desire, and the Modern American Novel*, is forthcoming with University of Chicago Press.

Cyraina Johnson-Roullier is Associate Professor of Modern Literature and Hemispheric Studies at the University of Notre Dame, concurrent in American Studies, Gender Studies and Romance Languages (French), and affiliate of the Initiative on Race and Resilience. A former Ford Fellow, Johnson-Roullier is the author of *Reading on the Edge: Exiles, Modernities and Cultural Transformation in Proust, Joyce and Baldwin* (SUNY 2000), and many essays on modernist, cultural, race, gender, and hemispheric studies, with public-facing work in venues including the *Chicago Tribune* and *Ms. Magazine*. Her current project interrogates Atlantic understandings of human and modernity through law, utopia and AI ethics.

Moderator:

Hayley O'Malley is Assistant Professor at Rice University. Her current book project, *Dreams of a Black Cinema*, is under advanced contract with Princeton University Press. Editorial projects include a volume of plays and screenplays by Kathleen Collins (with Samantha N. Sheppard and Alix Beeston), and a special issue of African American Review on "Black Literature+: African American Literature in Dialogue with the Other Arts" (with Brittney Edmonds).
