Introduction from the Local Organizing Committee

Dear MSA Members and Friends,

We are delighted to share with you the program for MSA 2023: STREETS. It's a particular pleasure to be hosting the conference now in New York City, after the abrupt postponement of our 2020 gathering due to the Covid 19 pandemic - and six years since we began working together on this shared project.

New York City has long been a stage for what Marshall Berman called "modernism in the streets," a modernism that encompasses not only the speed and scale of modernity at large, but also the energies of migrant communities and social movements that stake their claims on the streets.

Our theme of "Streets" aims to foster discussion not only of modernisms that have sought to remake the streets but also those modernisms (perhaps not going by that name) that have arisen from street level. It also aims to bring the study of global modernism to bear on the streets of this most genuinely global of global cities, but also on the streets that have helped to shape key moments in modernist art.

"Streets" relates broadly, also, to our five conference themes, from the questions of accessibility and the activism that animate "Street Access," a series of panels drawing deeply on work in disability studies, to the many papers in our stream "Environmentality In and Beyond the Modern" that consider the architecture and infrastructure of the built environment.

We have many people to thank for their help along the way, including many MSA board members, past and present, and the fifteen members of our conference Steering Committee from New York City and environs. Those thanks begin at the end of these introductory notes, but we can't wait to celebrate everyone's work—and everyone's ideas—when we meet in October.

Types of Session

The MSA 2023 Conference will feature several types of session, identified as follows:

- Panels of three or four short papers (15-20 minutes, depending on number of presentations) on related topics, followed by Q&A. 90 minutes. Attendance open.
- **RT.** Roundtables, generally featuring four or more speakers making remarks of 5-10 minutes each on a specific topic or set of topics. Audience discussion encouraged. 90 minutes. Attendance open.
- Seminars, featuring guided discussion of pre-circulated short papers by registered attendees, sometimes with the involvement of an invited participant. Sign-up at registration required. Generally capped at 15 participants per seminar, including leader(s) and invited participant(s). Two hours. Attendance is generally restricted to leaders, invited participants, and registered attendees.
- **WK**. Workshops featuring presentations, discussions, demonstrations, and more, on topics of interest to researchers in modernist studies. Two hours. Attendance open (except in the case of WK1: Film Studies Special Interest Group Workshop, for which the organizers request you reserve a spot at registration).
- **DE.** Digital Exhibits. Reflecting the growing role of the digital humanities in modernist studies and the proliferation of innovative work that does not lend itself to presentation in the form of a scholarly paper. Digital exhibits will be displayed Friday, October 29, 9:00am-12:00pm.
- WR. "What Are You Reading?" sessions take advantage of the simultaneous presence of modernist scholars from many locations, institutions, and fields. Each two-hour session consists of 8 to 10 participants. Led by the moderator, participants report for a few minutes each on a scholarly or critical book in modernist studies, sketching the work's content and explaining why they are excited to share it with other scholars.

WORKSHOP DESCRIPTIONS

WK1: Film Studies Special Interest Group Workshop (registration closed)

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 26 | 3:00-6:00pm

The advent of cinema coincided with the rise of modernism in the arts; yet the fields of film studies and modernist studies have generated their own genealogies of the modern grounded in different, sometimes conflicting theoretical and historical traditions. Building on this interdisciplinary foundation, the Film Studies Special Interest Group will explore the history and theory of cinema through its interconnections with other media while remaining anchored in the aesthetics of moving images and the generic specificity of film art. This workshop is capped at 50 people.

The group is intended to be a regular forum for collaboration and debate for both film historians and modernists who work on film. For an initial workshop at the Brooklyn conference, organizers will solicit essays that will then be pre-circulated for discussion during a three-hour workshop. This format will give participants the opportunity to exchange ideas, receive feedback, and also encourage a readership for their work. Participants are welcome to contribute an essay or take part as respondents. We will also devote time to talking about the future of the special interest group, its goals and procedures.



WK2. DIY Modernisms: Making Pamphlets Workshop

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 26 | 3:00-5:00pm

From early Hogarth Press publications to little magazines, pamphlets were an important mode of circulation for experimental modernist literary works. In this hands-on workshop, participants will learn to make and to teach with the pamphlet form. By undertaking a simple bookbinding exercise along with some surrealist language games as writing prompts, participants (and subsequently their students) gain an understanding of DIY publishing and its pedagogical, political, and literary potential. Pamphlet and small book making is a way of taking the spirit and ethos of modernist small press operations and applying it to the contemporary experiences and concerns of our students. Participants in the workshop will leave the session having made two pamphlets of their own and learned how to contextualize this book making exercise alongside early 20th-century historical precedents and to use this activity in teaching.

This book publishing workshop is open to all conference attendees, from those working on a dissertation or first book to those who have published several books. Publishers will discuss crafting book proposals and current topics, trends, and publication series information for modernist scholars. The presentations will be followed by questions from those in attendance and further discussion of individual projects and proposals.

WK4. PPL. Data Collectives (no reservation required)

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 28 | 1:30-3:30pm

This participatory workshop is aimed at introducing and organizing the Early Twentieth-Century Data Collective, a political and professional project drawing on similar effects in other fields (V21 collective, Post-45 Data Collective, etc.). We have an established group interested in working to develop open and collective datasets and frameworks for early twentieth-century and modernist literary studies. The primary purpose of this workshop is to introduce new and emerging scholars to some of the existing resources for collective work and data scholarship in modernist studies. For established scholars, we want to begin assembling resources in a way that allows for open reuse, review, and contestation within our field, on the model of other data collectives. We also will have an open discussion before



the workshop and after on what sorts of collective political projects we might advance: objects might include pedagogical materials, syllabi, book forums, career advice and training, hidden curriculum materials and advocacy documents for graduate students and contingent faculty. The workshop itself will work through some existing materials created for and by participants, describe the requirements and peer review process for the data collective, and discuss some of the scholarly and pedagogical goals for such work. We will articulate shared goals and objectives for open and transparent use and review of modernist data projects.

WK5. PPL. "You Work Where?": The Meaning of Research at Teaching Universities and Colleges (no reservation required)

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 28 | 1:30-3:30

This workshop is designed for researchers of any rank, at any career stage, who are contemplating the meaning of their modernist research within the institutional priorities and constraints of teaching universities or colleges. It endorses as it mocks the assumptions of its title question, "You work where?", playing with the idea that if you have to identify where you work, you must justify why you undertake research as part of that work.

This workshop seeks to arrive at new answers to questions about the value of research that arise from essential institutional statures and identities of colleges and teaching universities - institutions like those of the two workshop leaders that might claim "teaching university" status but retain traditions, cultures, bylaws, professional expectations, and even personnel rooted in a non-research "college" past.

The heart of the workshop will be small group discussions that bring together researchers at diverse points of career development, working at diverse kinds of institutions, in diverse locations. Prompts will structure discussion of when, what, and how we do research, but the ultimate purpose of the workshop is to lead participants to a clearer understanding of why they do research in places where research may obtain more instrumental value (a means to tenure) than intellectual value (a meaningful component of what we do as academics, creating knowledge about modernism and modernity).

CONFERENCE STREAMS

Our program also incorporates five "Streams" of interconnected panels, roundtables, and seminars. Each stream is identified in the program by a two- or three-letter acronym and has been organized by a pair of Steering Committee members with expertise in the relevant area. Streams feature sessions put together by the organizers and panels created out of individual paper proposals. The LOC thanks the stream organizers for their imagination, effort, and patience.

EiM - Environmentality In and Beyond the Modern

Organizers: Michael Rubenstein and Rochelle Rives

This stream will address such topics as energy; the representation of climate and weather in modern culture; concepts and practices of resilience; environmental racism, especially in urban environments such as Brooklyn; land art and modernist aesthetics; planning and the modernist impulse in development; the water-food-energy nexus; the animal; the "viral"; the human; the anti-human; and pollution as an idea and event.



HaH - Harlem as Hub

Organizers: Anne Fernald and Rafael Walker

Even for those who did not call Harlem home, this neighborhood was unquestionably an artistic hub for Black modernists on the East Coast. This stream will feature scholarship that captures the vibrancy, precarity, diversity, and collaborative spirit of this vital space. In focusing on one of modernism's most artistically and demographically diverse sites, this stream aims to attract scholars whose research and backgrounds, taken together, parallel this rich variety.

MaD - Modernism Across the Disciplines

Organizers: Ria Banerjee and Matthew Eatough

This stream brings together papers that assess reactions to modernism across humanistic and social-scientific disciplines concerned with the study of ethnicity and race. How do scholars working in (and between) fields such as Black Diaspora Studies, Caribbean Studies, Latinx Studies, and Asian American Studies conceive of modernism? Is it a useful term? An object of critique? A minor term within a wider cultural or disciplinary history? Do we even share a common object of study?

PPL - Precarity and Public Life

Organizers: Elizabeth Alsop and Václav Paris

This stream presents papers and talks that explore modernism's historical engagements with precarity as a condition of modern experience. How has modernism imagined, and been shaped by, precarity? What can modernist cultures teach us about precarious existence, including mechanisms of redress and response? How might the precarity of modernist studies as an academic hiring field galvanize new fronts for action or forms of organizing?

SA - Street Access

Organizers: Emily Bloom and Christopher GoGwilt

This stream features work at the intersection of disability studies, critical race studies, and street activism. While street actions remain a primary form of public activism, these demonstrations are often inaccessible to disabled activists. What alternative modes of resistance have been available to disabled activists, writers, and artists and how might the history of modernism help us understand new possibilities for resistance? What bodies, historically, have been granted the right of access to the streets? How do modernist cultures help us understand the intersection of race, disability, and activism?

MSA Code of Conduct

In order for the MSA to fulfill its mission and enact its values of free inquiry, collaboration, openness, access, and equity, such that all members have the opportunity to reap the full benefits of belonging, the MSA calls upon its members to support these values in judgment and in action. MSA members are expected to participate in the work of the organization with integrity and the highest standards of professionalism. In particular, MSA members should not:

- exploit or discriminate against others on grounds such as race, ethnicity, gender, gender identity
 or expression, sexual orientation, disability, physical appearance, religion (or lack thereof), or other
 group identity.
- sexually harass anyone they come into professional contact with, including students, colleagues, exhibitors, and staff members at partner institutions, hospitality and conference sites, or anywhere associated with the MSA and its programs.
- use language that is prejudicial or gratuitously derogatory.
- make prejudicial or arbitrary judgments (e.g., in evaluating conference proposals or grant applications) that might unfairly affect the academic freedom or professional development of anyone with whom they work.

Letter from the MSA President

Hello, modernist nerds, and welcome to MSA Brooklyn 2023!

To put it mildly, the last few years have been hard for many of us, as the everyday demands of teaching, writing, parenting, caregiving, burnout, or even literal survival have taken a toll. The pandemic is not over #WearYourMask, so the fact that so many modernist scholars are here today, dithering around the book exhibit, zipping to the next roundtable, and holed up in hotel rooms finishing their papers (you know who you are) is amazing and heartening. As a matter of fact, MSA Brooklyn is shaping up to be MSA's largest conference ever.

Brooklyn local organizing committee members Patrick Deer (NYU), **Amanda Golden** (NYIT), **Matthew Hart** (Columbia), and **Nico Israel** (Hunter College/Graduate Center, CUNY), along with a steering committee of scholars in the greater New York City area, spent three years organizing a fantastic conference for us. That conference was just months away—submissions under review, session rooms mapped out, visions of group dinners dancing in our heads—when COVID-19 pulled the rug out from under our feet and we were forced to reschedule it for 2023. It was the right thing to do—the only thing to do—but it was nonetheless harrowing. Rescheduling required renegotiating hotel contracts worth hundreds of thousands of dollars; it threatened the financial welfare of the organization; and it charged the local organizing and steering committee with the unthinkable task of organizing the Brooklyn conference not once, but twice.

I want to thank the many members of our scholarly community whose efforts have brought us to Brooklyn this week. Conference planning is often invisible, unremunerated, and underappreciated service in the best of circumstances, but the last few years have demanded that organizers (official, unofficial, ad hoc, etc.) go far above and beyond in service to our organization, to modernist studies as a field, and to the profession. The pandemic could have broken MSA, but it didn't, in part because of the (and I truly don't think this is an exaggeration) heroic efforts of local conference organizers and other members who spent six years putting together this week's conference for us. There are too many people who have contributed to this conference for me to name them all here, so please look at the list of organizers and board members in the previous pages of this program. Thank them for their hard work if you see them in the hotel lobby.

Thankfully, MSA has found a port in the pandemic storm. Past and present treasurers, **Lisa Mendelman** and **Matthew Eatough** adroitly navigated us through the most turbulent financial waters of recent years, and thanks to the stewardship of past presidents **Matthew Hart**, **William Maxwell**, and **Janine Utell**, as well as the dedicated work of members of the executive committee, we're no longer in perpetual Crisis Mode. This renewed stability has allowed the executive committee to focus on other pressing organizational needs in this ever-changing, ever-precarious profession.

This last year the executive committee has been meeting every month via Zoom for the first time, and we got a lot done. We ran MLA sessions, paid out travel grants, ran book prize committees, and held a special online session for international members. We selected a new editor, **Anjali Nerlekar**, and two new book review editors, **Stefanie Sobelle** and **Martin Harries**, for Modernism/Modernity. We hosted two working groups on the future of the conference and digital programming that sent recommendations to the board that we're now working our way through. Meanwhile, the Graduate Student Caucus and the Caucus for Contingent and Independent Scholars put together sessions, held meetings,

organized writing groups, and wrote an advocacy handbook (to get involved, contact **Zoe Henry** and **Kate Schnur** respectively).

There's more to report, but in the interest of brevity, I'll say that I am particularly proud of two of MSA's accomplishments in 2023. First, we established five special interest groups (SIGs) aimed at developing scholarly discussions and community at and between conferences, as well as fostering sociability and networking opportunities (contact SIG organizers to learn more).

Second, led by the efforts of the indefatigable **Christos Hadjiyiannis**, we partnered with the British Association for Modernist Studies, Modernist Studies in Asia, la Société d'Études Modernistes, and the Australasian Modernist Studies Network to organize the "Difficult Conversations in Modernist Studies" digital symposium last summer. This unprecedented event featured 15 sessions with panelists and audience members from all over the world. Over 700 free tickets for the symposium were "sold," and Octavio Gonzalez's session "Pedagogy and Race in the Modernist Studies Classroom" alone drew over a hundred audience members—how's that for global modernisms?

Still, there is much work to be done, and, as I end my (exhausting and exhilarating!) year as MSA president, the executive board continues to plan for the organization's future. As an organization and as individual members, we need to confront MSA's long history of racism and other forms of harm and exclusion. We need to make the annual conference—and MSA itself—more accessible, affordable, interactive, and welcoming. We need to amplify the voices and work of graduate students and contingent, academic-adjacent, and marginalized scholars. We need to continue to develop meaningful collaborations and high-quality digital programming. We need to find better ways to communicate with members, starting with our aged website. And, of course, we need to plan the 2024 conference in Chicago. In all this, we must be guided by commitments to anti-racism, social justice, accessibility, sustainability, and transparency.

This year's program is rich with possibilities, and I hope that we all leave Brooklyn energized by scholarly debates and reunions with old friends. I also hope that we leave with a renewed sense of communal purpose and generosity that will shape our work, and modernist studies, in the years to come.
